## FROM THE RECTORY, WELL ALMOST!

THE FIRST EUCHARIST OF THE NEW YEAR. We're still in the wintry season of Epiphany, but the heating has softened the hard edge of the cold, and we have three visitors. No, not Wise Men, but children – two of them small, and one of them tiny. And their parents, too. So, we are eleven for the Sunday service, of whom nine are establishing qualification to wed in St Andrew's later in the year. It's wonderful for Diana and me to be joined by these young people. But I can't help doubting whether a 17th century liturgical text is the most effective instrument to welcome them. I plough through the litany of 'thees' and 'thous', through Cranmer's doctrine of *one full, perfect and sufficient sacrifice, oblation and satisfaction for the sins of the whole world*, through the outlines of a microsermon. And I do all this with the memory of something like a trust that there remains warmth in the wick even if the candle is extinguished.

What a contrast with the joyous pop-up gathering of Christmas Eve. Nearly 30 people came to a service which they'd requested via Facebook. And what happened was largely decided not by a clergyman in his study but by the people who turned up.

## JOTTINGS FROM A COUNRY CHURCHYARD

I HOPE EVERYONE had a joyful, peaceful Christmas in good company, as I did! A bit late to wish a Hapy New Year to all but I will anyway.

I am writing this during the dark, wet spell of early January when it seems to it will never stop raining. The new year so far seems much the same as the old one: floods and strikes in England while aboard ever more wars, destruction, and devastation. But most of us, fortunately, have many blessings to lift us above whatever "downs" we suffer. Personally, I feel that dwelling on and worrying over the world's tragedies do no good – only prayers and possible personal practical help. So I am inclined as a matter of self-preservation to think positively and cheerfully of the joys of spring which cannot be many weeks away. Is that selfish? Living alone, I am dependant on friends for any social contact or support and I am not strong minded enough to remain cheerful and "ungrumbling" if I

dwell on the tragic events over which I have no control. Does anyone else feel the same? Or am I being hard hearted and selfish?

Having said that, in spite of the weather, signs of spring are everywhere as I am sure everyone has noticed. My earliest camellia, May Christian, has been in full flower since Christmas - a mass of large fragile looking yet so really tough single pink blooms. Daffodils several inches high everywhere, snowdrops showing white and primrose leaf rosettes among the fallen beech leaves. Also my winter sweet, chimnanthes fragrans, is covered in blossom but that is exposed to and hates frost so I must bring a few fragrant branches indoors to enjoy before they are blighted by the spell of frost and cold that is forecast soon. In the churchyard large clumps of snowdrops are in full flower already although there is little sign of the drifting carpets of them which appear annually. I have not noticed before that large groups of them appear in bloom before any sign of the rest. Perhaps we have different varieties and some are earlier than others? I believe there are hundreds of varieties but the visual differences in many cases are so slight that I couldn't tell one from another. However, I now find that we have a galanthophile (a snowdrop specialist) in the village who is interested in introducing new varieties to our spring snowdrop churchyard display. In years to comer, perhaps our own Chantry Snowdrop Festival?

The plan is to involve everyone in making posies during the course of the service which will be taken by Robin Isherwood.


Sunday January 28th, Richard King's monthly Informal service will be attended by the Area Dean, Caroline Walker as part of his Lay Worship Assistant course.

#### PATRICIA CRAVEN October 1938 – December 2023

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#### FREDERICK AUBREY STARR, 1928 - 2024

Fred moved to Manor Farm, in 1937, with his parents, brother Dennis and two sisters, Iris and Peg. They farmed the 149 acres with the children all helping their parents. Fred initially attended the original school in the village which was at that time in one of the barns at Manor Farm and this building is still known as the School House. Until the age of 11, Fred went to school full time and then left at lunch time to help his parents on the farm and aged 14 left school entirely to farm. After his parents died in the


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1970s he farmed solo at Manor Farm. He was renowned among the farming community as an excellent farmer who took exemplary care of his livestock, so much so, that his animals when poorly, used to be brought into the house, into what is now part of the kitchen, so he could care for them overnight. He was also an able builder doing all his own stone and brick work to a high standard. He sold Manor Farm at the age of 70 and moved next door to a bungalow he had had built on his own land and then poured his considerable knowledge of plants into creating a beautiful and productive vegetable and flower garden. Fred had never been away from his home for more than four hours at any one time and spent his first night not in Great Elm, in his late eighties, owing to a brief admission to the RUH.

Fred was a quiet, gentle, kind, family man and a really lovely neighbour. He leaves five nephews and nieces, Jeff and Heather, Mark and Lynn, and Chris. He will be fondly remembered.

## MELLS WITH VOBSTER



**MELLS PARISH COUNCIL** (mellsparishcouncil.Org..uk) Notes of meeting held on Tuesday January 9th 2024

**Council's Financial Position:** As part of the Local Government Finance Settlement, the Government announced a 6.1% increase in Core Spending Power for Somerset Council.

End of Charges for DIY Waste: Following a recent change of Government legislation current charges for disposing of construction and demolition materials including: asbestos, plasterboard, hardcore and rubble from household DIY projects have been removed. Each calendar month every household will be able to take up to eight, 50 litre sacks (or equivalent 2m sheets of asbestos or plasterboard) free of charge to a recycling site over a maximum of four visits in a month. Households will need to pre-book trips to dispose of this DIY waste, telling the council the amount of material they are disposing (up to 8×50 litre sacks per month) and the number of times they will need to visit (up to four visits per month). Disposal of asbestos, plasterboard or hardcore/rubble in excess of the free allowance can be paid for online.

**Health Research Grant:** The National Institute for Health and Care Research has awarded Somerset £5m over five years to form a Health Determinants Research Collaboration – a new research partnership to improve health and reduce health inequalities across the county. Somerset's HDRC will focus on the building blocks of good health such as housing, education and the physical environment to tackle the root causes of health inequalities and wider deprivation.

**Pavilion lease and future of recreation ground:** Discussions regarding the lease and financial way forward have begun as there is now only two years to run on the lease.

**Overgrown bush by Honeysuckle Cottage, Vobster**: Highways have inspected the area and are following the matter up. **Vobster noticeboards:** Cllr Brady has inspected the boards and quoted £84 for all the repairs, which was approved. Many thanks were extended to Alan for all the work he has done for the PC and shop which is greatly appreciated.

#### HIGHWAY AND FOOTPATH ISSUES:

Condition of grass triangle – Bottom Lane and area in front of Vobster Inn: Arrangements are being made to purchase the planters for outside Vobster Inn.

Accidents on Park Corner: The lines have now been re-instated.

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

Whatley Common Good Trust

At the recent meeting of the Whatley Common Good Trust the trustees agreed a bid for up to £650 for improvements to the path from the field to the gate that leads into the farmer's field to make it easier for parishioners and walkers, as part of the overall upkeep and improved infrastructure of the field. Currently the path is very boggy and difficult to walk through in winter.

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
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
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
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
