FROM THE RECTORY, WELL ALMOST!

IN THE OLD TESTAMENT READING for the first Sunday in Lent, God promises never again to destroy the world by flooding. The covenant is made in the medium of water, is signed in all the colours of light, a signature that once upon a later time will become that of Gay Pride. Water, the great symbol of life, in which we must be overwhelmed before we can be born. We perhaps reflect on our own baptism – and out of that, and of the dust of Ash Wednesday, Lent carries its own palette of symbols – austerity, restraint – so pale they're scarcely noticeable.

Compared with the world of our ancestors, the spiritual life of we 21st Century western Christians can seem impoverished. They had symbols; we have brands. They had ritual; we have habits. They had meaning; we have memes. When images were swept from our churches in the 17th Century, they took refuge in our minds, and the view took hold that the place of religion is inside our heads; faith no longer something we do, but something we think.

This delusion leads to a profound misunderstanding of religion as it is practised in most of the world. Last month, the head teacher of a North London school introduced a ban on what she called 'prayer ritual'. She claimed that it wasn't prayer that was being banned – people can pray in their heads – it was simply the accompanying ritual. But the ritual isn't some kind of optional side order, the spiritual equivalent of a bowl of fries: the ritual and the prayer are one. The act of prayer engages the whole self – mind, spirit, body – even if some 21st Century Anglicans do the bodily bit by being still.

A society in which it's held that we can separate ritual from prayer is a society in deep spiritual poverty. Ritual is the embodiment of meaning. Without it, we have only tokens, the Monopoly currencies of bankruptcy. I can't help but wonder just how daft we can get. You can pray, but you mustn't kneel. You may practise your violin, but it must remain in its case. You can skate, but you must keep off the ice. You may swim, but you must stay out of the water. You can love, but you may not touch. The spirituality of a pornographer's nightmare.

OH! THIS DREARY WET WEATHER. Thank heaven for snowdrops. I am writing this in early February, and it seems to have rained unceasingly for weeks. But thank heaven for snowdrops which seems to have exceeded themselves this year. This oddly changed climate seems to have suited them. The drawback is that one is as seldom tempted out to admire their abundance as one would on lovely sunny woodland walks. A hurried head-down plod with the dogs is about all this weather invites.

In the churchyard the snowdrops have spread their lacy carpets more richly than I ever remember along the south-eastern side and corner of the ground. This area was cleared of brambles and dead wood by helpers and so the snowdrops which must have remained hidden for years have quietly been multiplying and have now burst forth to air and freedom.

I have found the same in my garden where an area of ivy-covered ground has been lightly cleared and is suddenly studded with snowdrops which I have either forgotten or not even known were there.

Another treasure that seems to have prospered in the past wet year is camellias. Mine are so loaded with fat buds on every branch that I have had to resist cutting branches for use in my church flower arrangements. The glossy evergreen leaves make excellent foliage but this year I cannot find any to cut without sacrificing flower buds. Camellias, being shallow rooted, dry out quickly in hot weather but mild and wet weather seems to suit them a treat.

A generous friend brought me a lovely, scented bouquet of winter flowering shrubs from her garden. This included fragrant sarcococca which reminded me that mine died in the late short sharp freeze in 2022 so I will try and replace it with one of my Christmas or birthday gift tokens. (I then call the plant/shrub/tree after the token giver, so my garden is filled

with things like Ann's Japanese cherry, Sue's big green plant pot, Diana's daffs etc). Incidentally I have just had my 92nd birthday and my sideboard is graced with 51 beautiful cards which I will leave displayed to enjoy for several weeks. Although my family are few, I am blessed with so many wonderful thoughtful friends.

There must be little doubt that most things seem to be flowering earlier than ever this year. Many of the daffodils along the village verge are already in flower and the churchyard ones are showing fat buds. They will probably be over before Easter, although Easter this year is about as early as I can ever remember in March. Also, I have just noticed that my cherry plum in the orchard is just opening the first of its fat buds – in February instead of March.

Sadly, I cannot grow crocuses, either the early tiny specie ones or the fat mauve and yellow ones that everyone else seem to have in abundance. I have spent so much on crocus bulbs which never appear (do squirrels dig them up or mice eat them?) that I have long given up trying. I planted nearly 300 around my parents' grave years ago and have never seen a sign of them so even in churchyard I have no luck. Except for the last handful which I planted on the grave of Muffin, one of my long departed and much-loved cavaliers. These flower faithfully every year and are even now in early bloom (known of course as Muffin's crocuses).

In Chantry church we have at last acquired the necessary faculty for the removal of some pews and the installation of new heating and lighting. The pews have already been removed with much kind voluntary help but before we can put the other plans into action we have to embark on a programme of fund-raising. These things take time so I do hope I shall live long enough to praise and enjoy it all.

As I finish writing this there is a rare burst of sunshine so I must take Ebbie out and go and enjoy it before it rains. Yet again. See you in April. *Hazell*.

BENJAMIN PRINCE MELLOR

January 25th 1935 – January 30th 2024

On Tuesday February 13th, on a grey and rainy afternoon, St Michael's church in Buckland Dinham was full as mourners gathered from far and wide to celebrate the life of Ben Mellor, who has died aged 89. The church was beautifully decorated with spring flowers and lilies. The service was conducted by the Reverend Martin Weymont and attended by over 70 of Ben's family and friends.

Hymns were Love Divine, all Loves Excelling, and O Love That Will Not Let Me Go. The scripture reading was John 6:35-40, read by neighbour Peter Corbett.

In his address, Martin took us through the highlights of Ben's life. He emphasised how Ben's was a life well lived among family and friends. Ben came from a farming family in Derby and was himself a lifelong farmer through and through. He loved animals and was particularly handy at fixing things.

If there was something to be done, he was the man who could do it and would do it – an invaluable combination. Married in 1961 to Glenys, Ben spent many of his working years at Kingman's Farm in Hemington, moving to Buckland Dinham on retirement. A quiet man, he nonetheless had many strong friendships in the village, as attested by the number of people who came to say goodbye.

Martin concluded the service by reminding us of our faith as Christians in the resurrection and the life to come, ending on a note of hope. The beautiful Italian aria 'Time to say Goodbye" accompanied the congregation as they left the church for the graveside and the committal service.

Our thoughts and prayers are with Ben's family and friends at this time.

VILLAGE MEETING MARCH 26TH 7.00PM HOLY TRINITY CHURCH CHANTRY

It's taken nearly three years, but permission has been granted by the Church of England to make the necessary alterations for Holy Trinity Church to be a community hub, as well as a church. Pews have been removed to provide more flexible space. The next stage is to upgrade the heating and lighting.



Back in 2020, a village meeting agreed it was important that the church building was protected for the community. As a Grade 1 listed building it is an important heritage asset, but like many churches throughout the country, it will be in danger of falling into disuse and decay without a plan in place to take care of the building. There is no village hall in Chantry, so central to our plan was to make the church accessible to the community for non-religious events and activities (without losing its role as a church). To put this all in place we have created "Friends of Chantry" as a village organisation that will oversee the community use and support of the church building. Through organising events and activities, the aim is to encourage community involvement and to raise the necessary funds to maintain and upkeep the building.

The purpose of the village meeting is to introduce the Friends of Chantry team and to present our plans for the future. We will also have a discussion about any residents' ideas for Chantry. We look forward to seeing you there. Everybody welcome.



RECOGNISE THIS TABLE?

This elaborately carved refectory table, dated May 1914, has recently been discovered in an old cottage near Mells. It was modelled on a rare Elizabethan table that was owned by the late Lord Lincolnshire

(Charles Wynn-Carington, 1843-1828) at Gwydyr Castle, in the Conwy valley, North Wales. The table has carvings representing lions, an elephant's head, an eagle and fleur de lis. An elephant's head and fleur de lis were elements of the coat of arms of the



Caringtons, and the makers of the table were Nicholls and Janes, of High Wycombe - the firm's name is carved along the side, along with the date May 16th 1914. There is an intriguing story regarding the original table, which connects it with N&J's MD Ralph Janes. Ralph wrote in a memoir published by the Cabinet Maker Magazine in 1951 that the late Lord had allowed him to spend a week at Gwydyr Castle, probably early in the first decade of the 20th century, taking take moulds and drawings of the furniture. Ralph's concluding comment: "I secured material for making many interesting and beautiful chairs, court cupboards, tables and stools. Very many of them are now gracing British, American and Russian homes." This table is likely to be one of



the tables he was referring to, although exactly how it came to be in Somerset is a matter of ongoing research.

Nicholls and Janes also had a long association with the eminent architect Sir Edwin Lutyens, being the only High Wycombe manufacturers invited to contribute to his Queen Mary's Dolls House. N&J were also selected to make much of the furniture Lutyens designed for later commissions. Lutyens had a long association with Mells. Mells Park was built by Lutyens for the Rt Hon. Reginald McKenna in 1925 to replace an earlier house lost in a fire in 1917, but he had worked earlier for the Horner family on Mells Manor. According to an article on the Lutyens Trust website: "There is a strong sense, at Mells, of a village where Lutyens worked not just for clients but with friends". The table has been provisionally offered to High Wycombe Museum, but they are likely to want more details about its provenance - who was it made for and how did it end up in Mells? DID YOU KNOW WE HAVE A PRIZE-WINNING SHIRE HORSE IN THE VILLAGE?

Bomber is a year old, born in the stables behind the church. Already in his short life, he has won silver awards in big local shows, Mid Devon



and Gillingham and Shaftesbury. Claire Baber fell in love with the breed as a teenager after helping cousins with their four black shires and two (ex-Whitbread) greys.

When Claire broke her hand milking, she decided her life would be a whole lot better with her own shire, so she thought she'd have a quick search on the internet. One mare took her fancy so she went to just 'have a look' but the horse came back to Whatley with her! This impulse buy of a grey shire mare has led her to becoming a breeder of these beautiful animals, the

largest of the four main heavy horse breeds. Claire now has four shires in Whatley, two grey and two blacks.

Once these beautiful shire horses worked all the fields around Whatley. They were our tractors and transport, pulling carts of crops

and villagers to market, able to pull three times their own immense body weight. Now they are on the risk list of rare breeds.


