

## JOTTINGS FROM A COUNTRY CHURCHYARD

WELL, SPRING IS "BUSTING OUR ALL OVER" as the old song goes (that dates me, doesn't it?) in spite of the dreary wet weather we are still having up to the time of writing in mid-April. With all the ground saturation and flooding and gales, not only in our area but everywhere, there can be few who doubt the effects of climate change and global warning. We shall just have to accept it and work round it as best we can - perhaps digging drainage ponds (good to attract wildlife) and collecting rainwater in barrels against the inevitable droughts which our hotter summers will bring. I read recently an article which encouraged us all to be riend our garden visitors – even those we regarded as pests (I don't mean any neighbours who borrow tools and forget to return them). We all know that wasps do as much pollinating as bees, that worm casts on the grass mean the lawn is being well aerated and that snails are wonderful thrush food but slugs! If I tell you a secret, please promise not to pass it on lest I be regarded as cruel and heartless. I HATE slugs!! Last month I mentioned that only my white and pink hyacinths had been slug eaten. The very next morning after writing that I discovered rows of stalks where my blue hyacinths had

This is hurtful, not only because the poor bulbs had put a whole year's effort into their beautiful annual display but also they were special to me because dear friends have for some years given me a bowl of blue hyacinths at Christmas and, later, planted out have become an increasing garden display each spring. And now, all at once, totally gobbled up. Just wait till next spring, I might just surprise my friends the slugs!! I was complaining last month about the fewer varieties of small garden birds coming to my feeders. Meeting local friends after a group service recently several said they had noticed the same thing - scarcely any greenfinches or chaffinches, and thrushes we rare too. I haven't seen my regular woodpecker for a few weeks, but the nuthatch is so bold and fearless he practically demands that I replenish the nut feeder when it is low. He sits on the table beside it and stares at me till I go out and refill the hanging container. But otherwise I can only be sure of robin, blue tits and blackbirds coming regularly to feed. And usually each flies off in the direction of a particular area of tree or shrub where I am sure they are nesting - some already with hungry beaks to feed by now.

Recently scanning my bookshelves for something to re-read I came across a book by Monica Edwards who lived close to us in the wilds of the unspoilt Surrey hills in the 1950s. She wrote many children's adventure books, based on the exploits of her three children in the wild surroundings of their old farmhouse. She also wrote about their family life and problems restoring between them the almost derelict 16th century farmhouse. She describes the countryside as I remember it still when we left there in early 1970s – scything by hand their fields, all flower meadows "putting to the sword flower, grass and weed alike, moon daisies, small scabious, yellow hawk bit and rusty sorrel, all giving up their essential goodness to the haying." And, later, "there are few things more enchanting on a fine spring evening than to sit under a mist of new leaves, listen to the sundown concert of the bird, in which the nightingales so exquisitely played solo." And, later in the dark, "tawny owls in the dark ravine make their loud reiterated statement above the perpetual snoring of the nightjars." I wonder if any of this is still found there today, in spite of the region being listed as an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. I believe these AONB areas are re-classified as something about countryside which probably means they have less ecological legal protection.

Apologies! Not one mention of the churchyard. All is awakening there – the grass is covered with a carpet of golden celandine and white daises, sprinkled with patches of blue speedwell and violets and a drift of delicate windflower beneath the old conker tree. Oh! And a local fungi enthusiast found what he named as a St George's mushroom growing under the cedar tree which he cooked and ate (the mushroom not the cedar tree). See you in June. Rejoice in Ascension Day, May 9th. *Hazell*



Bryon had a store of memories of the village as it was and as it evolved, throughout his life, and he shared these willingly. Through all his busy life he was loved and supported by Audrey whom he met through his post office work and subsequently married. 

#### SOMERSET COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

**Purple chair scheme:** Purple chairs are being installed in Somerset's libraries to provide a safe space for women and girls to get information about health and wellbeing, as well as support and resources available to them including antenatal and postnatal care, breast cancer support, domestic abuse support, cervical screening, anti-social behaviour and harassment.

**Budget:** This has now been approved and Somerset Council will use up most of their reserves to achieve it. They have also applied for a Capitalisation Grant of £35 million which will cost them an additional £11 million in interest over 20 years.

**Hardship fund:** The deadline for receipt of applications has been moved back to September. Grants of £1,000 are available.

**Pot holes:** Pot holes should be reported to Somerset Highways as they will not pay out on a claim against them unless they are aware of the pothole in question.




#### **HIGHWAY AND FOOTPATH ISSUES:**

#### SAM CLARKE, OBITUARY


